Article from a Magazine or Journal Online in a Subscription Service

Author of Article (if given). "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Volume#. Issue # (year): page(s)(if given). *Title of Database*. Web. Date of Access.

Example:

Haw, Keith. "Cool Tools." Network Tools. 23.1 (2006): 34. eLibrary. Web. 15 Apr. 2006.

Essay or Chapter from a Book Online in a Subscription Service

Author. "Title of Essay." *Title of Book.* Editor. Place of Publication (if given): Publisher, date. page(s). *Title of Database.* Web. Date of Access.

Example:

Website (using a search engine to find information on the Internet)

Editor, author, or compiler name (if available). "Article Name." *Name of Web Site*. Name of institution/organization affiliated with the site (sponsoror publisher). Date of last update. Web. Date of Access <URL>.

Interview

Name of Person Interviewed (last name, first name). Type of interview (Personal interview, Telephone interview). date.

Example:

Smith, Joy. Personal interview. 12 January 2009.

E-Mail Message

Name of the Writer, "Title of Message from Subject Line." Message to Recipient. Date. E-mail. Example:

Williams, George. "Re: Global Warming Issues." Message to Sylvia Black. 28 November 2008. E-mail.

- Citations are based on the Modern Language Association (MLA) format.
- Look for the required citation information on the title page or the reverse (back) of the title page of a book. Many online subscriptions services include citation information with the article. Open website citation information may require some searching of the website. Check *Home* pages, *Contact Information*, and the bottom of web pages for the necessary source information.
- A *Works Cited* only includes the sources used and cited (parenthetically documented) within the paper or project. If a source appears in the Works Cited of a paper or project, it must be parenthetically documented at least once within the paper or project.
- Parenthetical documentation means giving credit within the paper or project to the source of the information. Parenthetical documentation was previously known as *footnoting*.
- A *Works Consulted* or *Bibliography* includes every source "looked at" in the course of researching the topic. Not all sources included in a *Works Consulted* or *Bibliography* are required to appear in the parenthetical documentation of the paper/project.
